The *Adelphi Papers* monograph series is the Institute's principal contribution to policy-relevant, original academic research. Eight papers are published each year and are designed to provide rigorous analysis of strategic and defence topics that will prove useful to academics, researchers, politicians and diplomats, as well as foreign-affairs analysts, defence commentators and journalists.

From the very first paper, Alastair Buchan's *Evolution of NATO* (1961), through Kenneth Waltz's classic argument in *The Spread of Nuclear Weapons: More May Be Better* (1981), to influential additions to the series such as Mats R. Berdal's *Disarmament*

and *Demobilisation after Civil Wars* (1996) and Lawrence Freedman's *The Transformation of Strategic Affairs* (2006), *Adelphi Papers* have traditionally provided analysis of key security issues, often serving to inform opinion, to stimulate debate and to challenge conventional thinking.

Longer than standard articles but shorter than books, *Adelphi Papers* permit the IISS both to remain responsive to events and to contribute significantly not only to debate on strategic affairs but also to the development of policy. While the format of *Adelphi Papers* has evolved over the years, through their authoritative substance and persuasive arguments recent issues have maintained the tradition of the series.

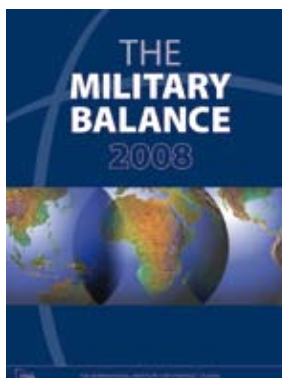

The Military Balance is the annual assessment by The International Institute for Strategic Studies of the military capabilities and defence economics of 170 countries world-wide. It is an essential resource for those involved in security policymaking, analysis and research.

The book is a region-by-region analysis of the major military and economic trends and developments affecting security policy and the trade in weapons and other military equipment.

This edition includes essays on unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) and the US and European defence industries in 2007, while in the regional texts there is an examination of Iraq's security forces. The comprehensive set of tables within the book includes the total deployment figures, by country, of personnel deployed on United Nations and non-UN peace support operations. There are maps showing the operational situation in Iraq and Afghanistan, the Darfur region of Sudan, Russia's early warning radar system, the new US unified command structure and the developing US ballistic missile defence network.

Key features

- **Military capabilities:** major military equipment holdings by service, role and equipment type.
- **Region-by-region analysis:** texts analysing selected defence and security developments by region, with selected supporting maps and data.
- **Defence economics:** analysis of major national and international developments affecting defence budgeting and procurement, with selected supporting data and tables, including on the trade in weapons and military equipment.
- **Comprehensive tables:** key data on military equipment and defence economics, such as comparisons of international defence expenditure and military manpower and selected operations and training activity.
- **Wallchart:** detailed Chart of Conflict showing current conflicts around the world, with selected supporting data and tables.

The Military Balance provides, in a portable volume, the high-quality, reliable information that is needed to keep abreast of the complex contemporary international security environment.

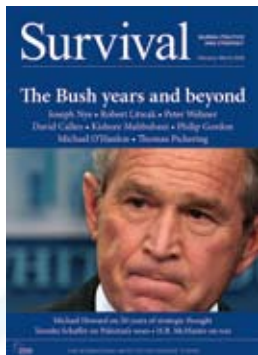

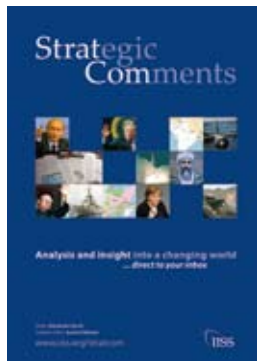

Strategic Survey is the annual review of world affairs from **The International Institute for Strategic Studies**. It is an invaluable tool for interpreting world-wide strategic developments. Since 1966, it has provided the essential one-volume analysis of the year's key events in international relations for government policymakers, journalists, business leaders and academics.

Strategic Survey opens with 'Perspectives', an assessment of the effect of major events and trends on the strategic landscape. Next, particular strategic policy issues, such as al-Qaeda's resurgence, climate change and security, and the military use of space, are examined in separate chapters.

Another seven chapters of similar length, written along thematic rather than merely chronological lines, cover developments in particular regions or countries. It concludes with 'Prospectives', an essay setting forth strategic priorities for the coming year, and a comprehensive index. Also included are 28 pages of maps depicting strategically important activity and political change and a chronology of key events.

The interplay of political developments and the actual or potential use of military force remains the publication's chief concern. Nevertheless, since the end of the Cold War and of the first distinct post-Cold War period, the IISS has recognised that any survey of matters strategic needs to broaden its scope to embrace economic globalisation and other aspects of the 'post-modern' world.

In order to provide up-to-date and objective information on conflict-related matters from around the

world, the IISS has developed the **Armed Conflict Database (ACD)**.

Compiled by the IISS Transnational Threats and Political Risk Programme, the **ACD** provides an interactive and user-friendly source of information on over 75 armed conflicts.

Born out of the IISS Chart of Armed Conflict, the database covers international and internal armed conflicts, as well as terrorism. It offers year-on-year analysis of conflicts, their political status, number of fatalities and weapons being used. It also covers current events, conflict backgrounds and timelines.

Each conflict is analysed in detail under the following headings:

- **Political trends:** analyses the latest developments in the conflict including its type, ongoing negotiations and peace processes
- **Human Security:** maintains a check on the human cost of the conflict. This feature informs the user of both the total number of fatalities in the conflict, and the number of fatalities in a specific year, as well as information about refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs).
- **Military & Security:** offers an overview on the general military balance between the combatants as well as annual military developments including arms acquisitions and military information pertaining to the conflict.
- **Latest timelines:** presents a constantly updated timeline relating to the conflict. When accessed, the user is automatically transferred to the current date, but by scrolling the user can quickly gain an insight into recent and historic incidents and developments. When searching for specific information the user can either browse through the different year-on-year reports and fact sheets online or generate reports.
- **Annual Update:** offers a summary of the main events during the year. A fact box succinctly covers the type of conflict, its parties, current status, the number of its fatalities and the weapons used. With the fact box comes a brief update of the year's trends and incidents relating to all features of the conflict.
- **Historical Background:** provides a researched historical background paper to the conflict, placing recent developments into perspective by explaining the underlying causes and tension behind the fighting.

The **ACD** has a built-in-function which can generate targeted reports on conflict data back to 1997 and correlates reports from various years, conflicts, regions and topics. Variables can be isolated or combined and the results are easily presented, either on-screen in a table or as a downloadable in CSV or Excel format. Timelines are updated on a weekly basis, reports on a quarterly basis, and the annual analysis is published each February.
